Along with this wine I discovered a talking monkey and a herd of golden dragons. The monkey and dragons I was forced to resell to procure my release from the local constable.

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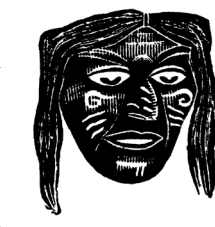


Unattractive Scar

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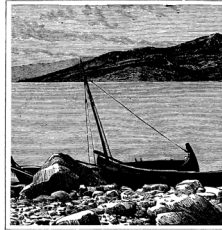


A Monkey Hunter

The monkey hunters of the region track their prey with the most astounding array of weapons, noise-makers, and hilarious costumes.

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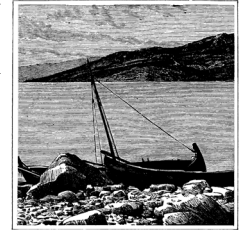


Boarding the Vessel

Here you see myself and my crew preparing for the terrifying voyage that awaits us by loading every conceivable variety of commercially available gadgetry on board.

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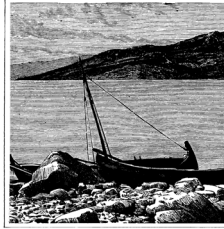


Champion Horse

This proud and domesticated beast was the champion horse of the region, having out-horsed several slightly less well-groomed and capable horses moments before this picture was shot.

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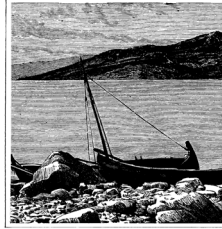


Michael Eats a Chicken

While others in the group found it repugnant, Michael subsisted in large part on the offerings of the local cuisine. Here he entertains the men by eating what the natives call a chicken.

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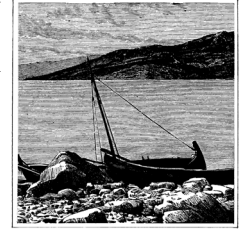


Mister Parker Swims

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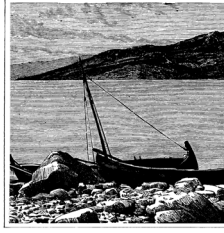


Misty Lake

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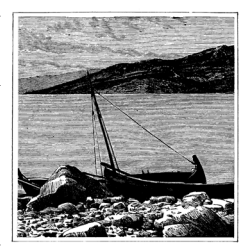


Dangerous Crevasse

Nothing puts a crimp in your day like tumbling into a deep, rocky crevasse. Luckily, a seasoned explorer always makes time for such misadventures.

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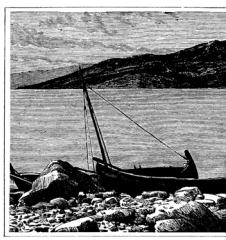


Frosty Morning Air

The air outside was frosty and cold. See how little detail of the countryside makes its way through the fog.

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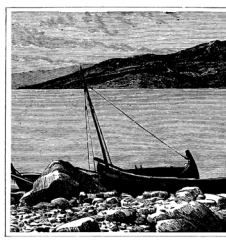


Giant Snake

Do not be confounded by the scale implied in this photograph. This snake was nearly a hundred feet long. It is also common for the pencils of the region to weigh nearly a ton.

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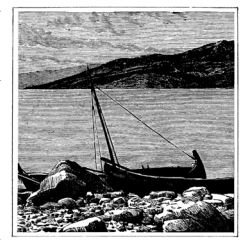


My Room

It was in these conditions that I slept, ate, and carried out other necessary functions for more than six months, all the while remembering that I was here for the betterment of mankind.

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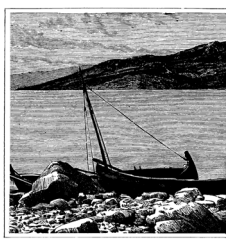


Our Climbing Gear

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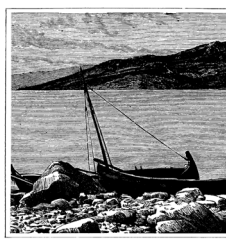


Stormy Seas

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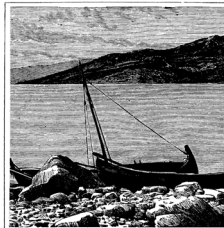
Ice Caves

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Jerry Freaks Out

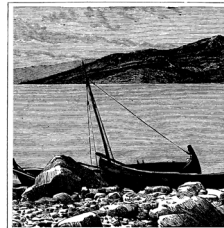
Photograph (Gift Shop)

As you can see, the horrors of exploring the corners of the globe can render even the most well-tempered man incapable of social propriety. Jerry, as is plainly evident, has had enough.

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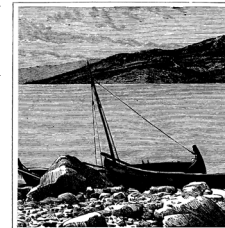
Fran Frozen to Death

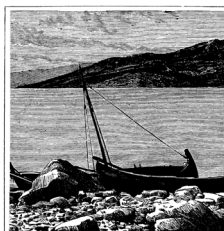
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The Colorful Natives

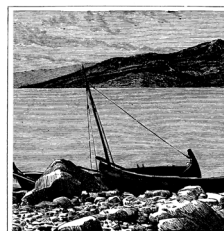
Photograph (Gift Shop)
