**Add** dried, pressed plant specimens, if desired, on pages with glue and/or thread.


**Add** additional spells or illustrations, if desired. New items can simply be written/drawn in, or glued on to the pages.



One teaspoonful of the dried herb with one of Motherwort is simmered in I punt of boiling water until it measures 1/2 funt. This is then administered in three doses of 3 %. or. before meals.


A syrup is made of the seed and flowers to stay



APPARENTLY A RITUAL WAS INVOLVED IN DIGGING IT UP. BLACK HELLEBORE IS ALSO AN INGREDIENT IN AN INCENSE FOR CONSECRATING TALISMANS OF SATURN. AGRIPPA RECOMMENDED IT AS PART OF A FUMITORY FOR RAISING SPIRITS OF MARS, AND IT GOES INTO THE CAULDREN OF CERRIDWEN BREW. A TINCTURE OF BLACK HELLEBORE WAS USED IN SINGLE DROP DOSES AS A DRASTIC PURGATIVE IN MENTAL ILLNESS OR TO SLOW A RAPID HEART, BUT IN LARGER DOSES IT CAUSES DEATH BY CONVULSIONS AND HEART FAILURE.

# lower Pressing

- 1. A Jeru, including some rootstock, is cleaned earefully by hand, to remove soil.
- 2. The thick Phizome, which otherwise would be unpressable, is slied in half lengthwese with the ever-handy pocketkinge. Some other parts have to be adjusted the same way.
- 3. The specimen is positioned at one end of a wide sheet of unprinted newsprint, which will be Jolded over on top of it.
- 4. The newsprint is just one layer that goes inside the press: there is also thick blotter paper on each side of the newsprint, and currogated cardboard layers on both sides of that. The press is merely two wooden frames and adjustable straps that hold the layers together tightly. In the absence of a press, plants could be layered throughout a phone book, with paper towel replacing the layer of newsprint and newsprint substituting for the blotter papers.
- 5. Sometimes a specimen is too tall for the press, as an iris is. but one needs a record of the true size of the plant, so he folds it.
- 6. The iris is labeled and dated as to when and where it was collected: if the flower is moist or delicate, was paper is placed over it to keep it intact when the nwesprint is lifted, before the press is closed and placed in a dry, ventilated shot for up to several days. Succeed plants will take longer and require new blotter paper daily.

## TO MAKE INCENSE

Grind together in mortar and pestle combination of the following, then store in a bottle or empower and use:

2 OR MORE HERB PORTIONS: Rosemary, Gedar, Thyme,

Sandalwood, Rose, Bay, Cinnamon, Juniper, Pine, Basil, etc.

1 GUM RESIN PORTION: Frankrinense, Myrrh, Bentoin,

Arabie, Mastie, Copal, Dragon's Blood, etc.

LIQUIDS: Essential Oils, Wine, Honey, etc.

SWEET SCENTS are for positive goals.

FOUL SCENTS are for banishing.

Combustible incense contains potassium nitrate (cones, stick, paper) and can smolder by itself. This creates stream of smoke. Non-combustible (powder form) is sprinkled on charcoal blocks in censers. This creates puffs of smoke.


#### ISIS HEALING BREW

## ANDLE LORE

Diffred candles

Two earelles are di ed at once, one at either end of a wick.

ellett beeswase or paraffin in a double boiler. The container for the wase can be a cancile-diffing fot or any fot tall enough to aucommodate the length of cancile you're making; it should be placed in a stockfot about half full of water set over an electric burner on high heat. Monitor the temperature with a cancily thermometer; it should remain below two hundred degrees. Because heated was can ignite, never leave it unattended, and lower the heat immediately if you smell the was burning or if it starts to smoke. Two to three founds of wase may require an hour or more to melt. The color can be deepened with shaving from a block of clarker beeswase or wase-dye hellets.

As the wax is melting, pepare the wiek: Cut a length of wieking that will leave enough room for differing a eardle on each end. Sie weights to wiek ends—try Jishing weights, metal unts, or several pennies stuck together with bits of soft wax. Use Jifteen-fely wieking for thin takers, twenty-four-fely for eardles thinker than half an unch.

Set the temperature of the wax and seal the wish by diffing the ends, up to the desired length of the candles, into the melted wax. It should harden four seconds after the wish is removed (at about 165 degrees). To make the candles: Hold the wish at the midpoint, dif the ends into the wax, then plunge the candles into cold water. Prepart this process until the candles reach the desired diameter.

Hang the finished candles over a broom balanced on two chair backs, making sure the candles don't touch.

Allow them to harden for a day in a cool, draft-free shot. With a mat hense, slive off the weights and receipt the ends to finish the taper bottoms.

## Rolled Candles

These randles are made from softened sheets of solid beeswap.

Theat an electric griddle to three hundred-fifty degrees or an oven to two hundred-fifty degrees.

If using a griddle, lay a sheet of war on a piece of terrycloth toweling that has been cut to size. Weat for three or four initutes. When the sheet is warm and pliable, remove it quickly and place on a work surface. To soften in an oven, place the sheet on a towel-covered cookie sheet and warm for two minutes. Using a mat knife, cut the war to the desired height of the randle.

- 1. Tay a length of wicking salightly longer than the ward along one end of the sheet. Koll the war, keeping the ends even.
- II. To make a square randle, press down as you roll the war until you have four flat sides.
- III. Sothen the randle has reached the desired dimensions, slice off excess war. For an outer skin of different hue, roll the cooled randle in another sheet of softened war.
- IV. To finish the randle and erase the seam, roll it quickly on a metal bar lavailable from strap-metal dealers that has been heated on the griddle or in the oven. For a square randle, press eath side against the bar.
- V. Smooth rough edges with a warm metal tool such as a palette knife or a trowel.
