# STRADIVARIUS VIOLIN

#### Location: Rome, Italy

**Background**: Antonio Stradivari was born about 1644 and died in 1737. He was the most famous violin maker in history, although he also made violas and cellos. He worked in Cremona, Italy, and developed a secret varnish, which gives his violins a distinct orangered color. Many people think the varnish produces the fine sound of the instruments. Stradivari took the secret of the varnish with him to his grave and it has never been duplicated.

#### THE TORCH FROM THE STATUE OF LIBERTY

Location: Liberty Island, in New York Harbor

**Background:** The 152 foot high statue of *Liberty Enlightening the World* was designed by sculptor Fredric Auguste Bartoldi. It was built by Alexandre Gustave Eiffel, designer of the Eiffel Tower in Paris. It was declared a national monument in 1924 and the site it was built on was renamed Liberty Island in 1960.

## MOUNTAIN GORILLA

#### Location: Uganda

**Background:** There are three different families of gorillas and the mountain gorilla is the rarest. Probably less than 450 are alive today. They are impressive apes standing almost 6 feet tall and can weigh up to 450 pounds. Despite their ferocious looks, they are gentle plant-eating animals. Baby gorillas weigh only 5 pounds when they are born.

## THE GREAT WALL OF CHINA

#### Location: Northern China

**Background:** The great Wall of China was begun in 3rd century B.C., and was not finished until the 17th century A.D. It was designed to protect the frontier of China and it stretches from the Yellow Sea to central Asia and stands 25 feet high. 40 foot towers were built every 200 yards. It is 12 feet wide on top, so that horses could ride along it.

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# Your Briefing

Congratulations — you've been hired as a rookie detective for the Acme Detective Agency. Your goal is to outsmart Carmen Sandiego and her gang by solving the cases in this book.

There are four cases to solve. Start by removing the cards from the middle of this book. Divide the cards into four groups. You should have the following:

4 Stolen Object Cards 4 Bookmark/Scorecards 8 Suspect Cards 8 Map Cards

Each case involves a stolen object. Decide which case you are going to solve by picking a **stolen object card**. Put the other stolen object cards away until you are ready to solve those cases.

Use a different **scorecard** for each case. As you read through each case, you will be given clues about the suspects. Write these clues down on your scorecard. Compare these clues to your **suspect cards.** Only one suspect will fit all the clues. Once you have picked a suspect, set aside the other cards until the next game. Each time you are told to go to a different number in the case, mark your **scorecard**. These are your travel points.

When you go to a new number, you may use the **scorecard as a bookmark** to hold your place while you're investigating — sometimes you will have to retrace your steps.

Use the **map cards** for information about the various places that you'll have to visit while tracking down a suspect.

# HOW TO SCORE THE GAME:

To win, you must solve the case by finding the right suspect in the right place. You cannot win if you capture the wrong suspect. Once you've found the crook and the stolen object, add up your **total travel points.** Check this score on the last page to see if you've earned a promotion. You earn a promotion by capturing the crook and stolen object in as few moves as possible. The lower your total number of travel points, the more chances you have of earning a promotion.

Ready? Okay — put on your raincoat and hat and get ready to set off on another dangerous mission for the Acme Detective Agency. Rain clouds hang over the city as you enter the Acme Detective Agency Building. It's Monday, and you know that nothing good *ever* happens on a Monday. The receptionist looks up at you and gives you a dazzling smile. You sigh because you know you've just had the one bright moment of your day.

"The Chief is waiting for you in your office," she tells you.

"It figures," you grunt. "It's Monday."

Your office is just down the hall. The bulb by the door has burned out, casting dark shadows across your nameplate. You enter the room to find the Chief sitting in your swivel chair. He looks older than he did on Friday, and you're sure his hair has turned even more gray.
