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BlackEagle nets war criminal!

BlackEagle nets war criminal! By Hal Dent, (Ops, Marseilles)

With Operation: SUPUN (Support the UN; Imaginative, huh?) well into its second month, we scored a major coup this month - the capture of Bernard Chekeyevitch, a Bosnian wanted for mass murder, attempted Genocide, and multiple counts of rape and looting, within the former Czechoslovakian states during the late 1990's civil war.

BAT III unveiled By Bryan Deliqois (L&P, Atlanta)

Following on from the tragic events outlined in issue 118 of the BlackEagle/BlackEagle Express, and the report to Clifton BlackEagle from Operation Back Up, BlackEagle/BlackEagle finally signed a deal with CMI Systems of the UK (formerly Commilint Plc), to supply BE/BE with a replacement for the compromised BAT II communications system, used for our out-of-area work.

This system is more versatile than the old one, is far more secure, far more resistant to system attacks, and far, far, more reliable by far.

We will be issuing type one handsets on a personal issue (and return!) basis, and type two units on a oneper-team basis. The system will go live in June 2000, at which time all the issue equipment and briefing packs about the system's capabilities and usage will be circulated to company offices around the globe. CMI Systems are a leader in the remote sensing, communications security, and personal radio comms technology fields.

Marseilles Regional Roundup By Jean Louis Tessier, (SCL, Marseilles)

President's Sitrep by Clifton BlackEagle

Culinary Combat by Jeremy Carr, retired Ops, chef LeTorres

Last issue we looked at military rations so this time we will look at civilian pre-pack. By pre-pack we mean foods that are open and eat. Heating may make it more enjoyable, but nothing that has to be cooked. Cooking will have to wait for next issue.

The first variety of pre-pack is survival rations.

Primarily restricted to America these are usually imitation military rations that are over priced, foul tasting and of questionable nutritional value. Outside of the fact that they won't taste any worse after ten years on the basement shelf they are best avoided.

The next type is geared towards sports and outdoor crowd.

Prices range from reasonable to extremely expensive, but they have good nutritional value and convenient packaging. While there are full meals, most of this type of packaging is snack food.

Protein bars and "trail mix" are the two most common examples. Protein bars are kind of like MREs in candy bar form with lots of calories and carbohydrates, plus a good selection of bearable flavours.

Trail mix comes in hundred of varieties and is easy to make yourself, but is essentially nuts, seeds, dried fruit, granola and some sort of flavouring. In addition to its use on the trail, a bag of trail mix is good at combating the munchies on a long surveillance.

The final variety comes off the shelf of the local market. Price is usually the lowest of any option, but weight must be monitored for field operations. This is especially true with canned goods.

Two big concerns with cans are making sure the contents if unheated and packing liquid are eatable. Most canned soups taste terrible when cold, and liquid from most beans and some fruits have to be discarded, meaning you carried extra weight for nothing. Good choices for canned goods are tuna (in water not oil), fruit in light syrup, stews, vegetables, pasta and sauces, and of course Spam. If you are going to go with cans make sure you bring several can openers.

Good choices for non-canned off the shelf are crackers, instant noodles, cured meat, cheese, vegetables (varieties that are eatable raw), apples and oranges are the best choices for fruit, and candy.

Hard candy is great for long marches and bite-size candy bars can supply quick energy.

Sports drinks are incredibly popular in the civilian field, and if you can find what that is palatable then why not. It may be of some value for the electrolytes and vitamins, but remember you cannot cook with it or brew coffee or tea so don't replace all of your water.

Well, that's it for this edition; eat hearty, eat hale!

Ye Gods, now I know why they call you guys the Last Minute Dot Cell!

Winging It!! By James DiFalco (Ops, London)

I've just returned from our Cells month long (wound induced) vacation (which, as always, turned into a 'busman's' holiday) to find a memo on my desk from Paul asking for an article for the bulletin. Tricky thing to do when you're still in holiday recovery mode - quite literally when you've spent a week visiting various rum joints in the Caribbean.

What I thought I'd write about is the virtues of 'winging it' on assignment i.e. drop the planning (well some of it) and just doing it.

Let me state right from the start that a lot of what we do as a company needs careful planning and, without it, assignments tend to fail, and lives are lost.

My main concern is the over-planning, and over complication of basic missions. By taking a few basic steps, I believe you can save time, resources and reduce your chances of being caught by just getting in there and doing it.

A police friend of mine once told me that the hardest crimes to solve were those done on impulse, e.g. You are out shopping, you see a security company picking up the stores takings, you're down on your luck and think 'sod it', you snatch the cash bag from the guard and run. By acting on impulse, you've left the police few trails - you haven't been seen staking the place out over the last few weeks, you've not stolen a get away car, you haven't told anyone what you're up to, etc.

The first thing you need before you attempt to wing it is the right sort of background and personality. Not everyone is good at thinking on their feet, or at bluffing through personnel encounters, just as not everyone is able to keep their head in combat or survive in the jungles of Borneo.

Secondly you have got to have a realistic view of what you are going to be up against. Intel or prior knowledge is obviously the best way to assess potential threats and obstacles, although the former sometimes takes time to gather depending on what you're after. Common sense and a realistic world view (i.e. not one based on what you've seen at the cinema) are also useful aids - the security at a small company will probably consist of a female receptionist with a typing speed of 40 words a minute, not an ex-Navy SEAL with the Medal of Honour who's been the point man in 90% of CIA black ops!

Thirdly you need to assess the consequences of fouling up, if they are to high play it safe, plan your task in more detail. High risks doesn't just mean casualties, it also includes impact on overall assignment targets - are you going to force the bad guys hand, will more obstacles be put in your path?

Lastly, although you're winging it, make a basic plan of action, what do you do if they don't buy your story, how do you get out if it hits the fan? Think of the role you're playing if your bluffing your way in - how would people expect you to act, why are you here, where have you come from.

And now an example.

Task : Obtain files known to be kept on Director X's desktop PC in his office in Largish Corp. headquarters.

'Mad Mick' the ex-para, ex-SAS cell member (this guy scares me) starts to suggest night-time entry, from roof, absail down, in through the window - flash bangs, spraying room with MP5's, at least a mag into each person 'just to be sure', etc (maybe I'm exaggerating). (Maybe not - even I'VE heard of Mad Mick! - Ed)

Sebastian, the ex-spook, starts planning either a blackmail type sting, or kidnapping a family member. Exchanging worried glances with Harry the 'ex-con' cell member, I volunteer me and him to carry out some recon.

We drive to the company, which is situated in some towns industrial district and have a brief look around. The building is fairly large with entrance via a lobby. In front of the building is an employees car park which has no security on it at all. We drive in here and I get out to ask directions at the lobby, so that I can get a look at the security there.

I walk in and before me I see a counter, behind which sits an ageing receptionist chatting with another employee, with a security guard - all 5'6" and 20 stone of him (none of which is muscle)- from a private security firm joining in the discussion on where's the best place for a weekend holiday.

To my left is a security door with a card swipe - which is opened by a suited employee on his way out - I approach the door and he kindly holds it open for me, I thank him and enter.

I wander confidently down a corridor until I reach a large open plan office area. I go up to the first workstation I see and ask where Mr X's office is, explaining that I'm ten minute late for a meeting. The employee is not really interested in what I've got to say but directs me to the office.

I follow his directions and stroll pass the office, it is empty, but X's secretary 'guards' the door. I carry on and enter another part of the office area and find an empty desk, I ask the person in a nearby desk whether it's okay to use the phone on this desk, which of course it is, and ask if they know X's extension number. Obtaining the number I ring it, and when the secretary answers I ask her to attend reception to sign for a package for X. I then make my way briskly but calmly to the office, where I enter the office, and after disconnecting various cables, I walk out with the PCs base unit and a handy pad of A4 paper, containing some rough notes about something completely obscure.

I walk through the offices, pass the secretary in the corridor, studying my A4 pad which contains my maintenance schedule (okay, it's gobbledegook, but I've got a good imagination). The security door has a push button on this side - no need to swipe as I must be authorised to come at it from this direction -I push it and head boldly for the exit staring at my pad, shaking my head and grumbling about the 725's (whatever that is). Out into the car park, into the waiting car, and back to the office.

Think that's unrealistic? I'm afraid it's not. Ask a social psychologist, we make a lot of assumptions throughout our day. Sitting in the office we assume the people there should be there, the man carrying the PC must be an engineer etc.

Just to end my ramblings, winging it works, but only use it after careful consideration, and in the right circumstances. If in any doubt, plan.

I heartily recommend the last comment: If in doubt, plan, folks. Remember: Prior Preparation Prevents Piddling Poor Performance!

News from L&P... by Todd Bell, L&P, Atlanta

Greetings from L&P!

The big news is that BlackEagle is close to agreement with the US Justice Department to enable operatives to access the CIC fingerprint database.

Only a couple of points remain to be resolved. Once we have a signed agreement we will get the processing procedures set up and end user equipment available as soon as possible. Conservatively, we estimate no more than six to eight weeks before everything is operational.

On the new equipment front we start with the Leica LRF800 range finder. Of monocle design with 7x magnification, small size (100x95x35mm), light weight (0.3kg) and 1m accuracy from ranges of 10 to 800m. Optical quality is well up to Leica's superior standards. Price is a reasonable \$450.

Another new range finder system is the N/CROS Mk2 from International Technologies Limited from Israel. The base of the system is a 3x binocular unit measuring 210x200x78mm and weighing 1.6kg that incorporates a third-generation image intensifier, digital compass and eye safe laser range finder with a range of 2000m (accuracy of 1m to 200m, 2m to 500m and 5m over 500m). The built in data bank can store data for 10 targets and a RC-232 port allows interface with GPS and other combat computers. A good discount allows us to offer this unit for \$3995.

For those who love new firearms we have a few Parker Hale IDWs (Individual Defence Weapons) in stock. Of mostly composite construction, with progressive trigger, low rate of fire (400rpm) and claims of negligible muzzle climb even on one hand full auto fire. No iron sights are provided, but the entire length of the receiver is topped by a Picatinney rail. Available only in 9mm and costing \$1200, this is a compact and capable system. After all, after the fiasco of the SA-80, would the British have bought another donkey?!

A couple of final notes.

We are now able to offer Insight Technologies and Streamlight flashlights, tactical lights, and IR illuminators at 30% off retail.

We now have a recommended content list for "God Forbid" bags that seems to be acceptable to senior staff. All of the contents are available from L&P or local stores.

For those who want specialised firepower, we can now special order the French FLY-K TN8111 silent individual grenade launcher (more appropriately a 51mm mortar). Plan ahead, folks, as delivery time is around three weeks.

Finally, as Mr. BlackEagle mentioned in his Sitrep, our legal boffins here in Atlanta have issued a salutary piece of advice, which we have had to act on. A recent ruling in California resulted in a security company going out of business last month.
